It tells the story of a Mexican boy who tries to save his beloved bull Gitano from a deadly duel against a champion matador. The movie won the Academy Award for Best Story and was nominated for two other Academy Awards.

A *Selichot* or Hebrew book of penitential prayers and poems to prepare for high holidays and or fast days, clearly put to much use. The National Library of Israel have a number of digitized copies of Zerndorf's *Selichot*, including our edition which helps us document that our copy is complete. The only difference is that in our copy the one leaf that is printed in two columns and which bears advertisements is bound in at the end and in theirs it is bound in following the title page.¹

On the free endpapers and upper pastedown there are contemporary ownership inscriptions from Saloman Nepthali Wangen. Possibly Salomon Naphtali, born 1784 in Sulzburg, Germany and died in 1863 in Wangen, Germany or Saloman Nephtali of Wannbach, Germany, born 1841.²

The lists contain roughly 300 names and addresses of mostly well-known German companies such as A.E.G., Agfa Foto, and Bayer, but also identifies less well-known businessmen. Scarce in the trade.

Matthew Arnold (1822–1888) was an English poet and cultural critic. His religious views were unusual for his time and caused much disagreement with his friends. In this book, Arnold seeks to restate and simplify the language of Isaiah XL–LXVI. He pronounces this portion of Isaiah as translated into English "almost or quite unintelligible" (in contrast, the Hebrew text he describes as "genius"). Arnold rewrites the 26 chapters that he gives the new title of: "The Great Prophecy of Israel's Restoration".

In vain we seek Arnold's interpretation of Isaiah. He however states that he draws no conclusions, but lets the text speak for itself. "I will bring thy seed from the east, and gather thee from the west; I will say to the north, Give up! and to the south, Keep not back! bring my sons from far and my daughters from the ends of the earth." Isaiah 43.5–6 (pg. 48).

The story of Joseph Süß Oppenheimer had been the subject of a number of literary and dramatic treatments over the course of the past century, the earliest was Wilhelm Hauff's 1827 novella. The most successful literary adaptation was Feuchtwanger's. Feuchtwanger intended his portrayal of Süß not as an antisemitic slur but as a study of the tragedy caused by the human weaknesses of greed, pride, and ambition.

It is one of the first books to explore the German invasion of Poland from a literary perspective. This is the true first edition, published in Mexico.
